ANCESTRAL HOMEGOING



At the end of a weeklong, five-city journey, thousands of New Yorkers marched to the sound of spiritual drumming as they escorted the remains of New York City's first Blacks to their re-interment in the now historically landmarked African Burial Ground (ABG).

On Friday, Oct. 3, marchers stopped traffic in the Wall Street area as they paraded from South Street Seaport near where New York's colonialera slave market stood - to the site of the consecrated burial site. After a nightlong vigil, on Saturday, Oct. 4, the remains of the four Blacks, which had traveled on the five-city tour, were slid into place in one of the many massive crypts containing the remains of 415 other colonial-era Africans.
